# County Opposes SDG&E's High Wind Shut-off Plan

Jacob says utility's flawed plan is misguided and dangerous attempt to shift liability onto taxpayers

t was a packed house at the County Administration Center late last month when rural water districts, the San Diego County Office of Education, telecommunications companies and residents cheered as the Board of Supervisors voted 4-0 to oppose San Diego Gas and Electric's controversial high wind shut-off plan.

Chairwoman Jacob, along with Vice Chairwoman Pam Slater-Price, brought the matter before the Board and encouraged their colleagues to take a strong position against the proposal, which calls for shutting off power to some 60,000 mostly rural homes during high winds.

SDG&E first approached Chairwoman Jacob about the controversial proposal more than a year ago. She was skeptical but not entirely dismissive. The concept is radical and unprecedented, but fire is an especially deadly force.

Chairwoman Jacob issued SDG&E this challenge: if SDG&E could convince stakeholders that the shutoff plan was the right thing to do, she wouldn't oppose it.

One year later, however, nearly all key stakeholders are vehemently against the plan, including vulnerable seniors, people with disabilities and two safety divisions within the California Public Utilities Commission, the State regulatory agency that will ultimately decide the plan's fate.

Opposition groups have offered clear and convincing evidence that the plan is not worth the gamble. Its risks to

Pilots from the Sheriff's Department, Cal Fire, the U.S. Navy, the U.S. Forest Service, the City of San Diego— even pilots from the

to life and property are far greater with the power off than the power on.

Here's a possible scenario: SDG&E cuts power. A fire breaks out. The fire is not caused by a power line; it's caused by a tossed cigarette or a lost hunter. It's night. Try evacuating in the darkness. Your electronic garage door won't work. You smell smoke. You have no TV, radio or Reverse 911. Your family can't reach you because cell sites need electricity. Now, imagine you're a senior on a breathing device or a young, scared child.

It's no wonder the County's Office of Emergency Services is opposed to entering into an agreement with SDG&E on the shutoff plan. OES recognizes the problems associated with that action. Taxpayers would be on the hook for the flood of lawsuits that would ensue if the plan is approved!

Instead of a risky plan that would jeopardize lives and property, Chairwoman Jacob is urging the utility to focus on proven measures that will prevent fire: underground lines in high-risk fire areas, wider spacing between poles to prevent arching, stepped up maintenance scheduled, improved vegetation management near lines and swapping wooden poles with steel poles.

# Hero Finn Celebrates **Century Mark**

earl Harbor hero and East County legend John Finn will add another accomplishment to his extraordinary legacy this month. The oldest living Medal of Honor recipient turns 100 years young on July 23.

Finn was a chief petty officer in his early 30s when bombs fell on the U.S. Navy base in Hawaii that fateful day in 1941. Wounded five times, he refused to leave his position and continued firing his machine gun at Japanese planes. His bravery inspired fellow soldiers to return to their guns and stand their ground.

More than 500 people flocked to the La Posta Diner last month to wish Finn early birthday cheers. He received numerous commendations, ceremonials flags

and hugs and handshakes from the masses. Chairwoman Jacob was honored to proclaim the day John Finn day throughout the region and is grateful for the service of this cherished constituent.
